#### From Fr. Bill.... Love Forever Being Born

I admit that I am fascinated by the images taken by the James Webb Space Telescope. If you don't know about James Webb, it is a space telescope designed to

and novices alike, to view objects too old, distant, or faint for the Hubble Space Telescope to see.

So, what does the James Webb Space Telescope have to do with Advent and the Church? Well, until recently, I would have struggled to answer that question. That is, until I happened upon Kelly Latimore's new icon of the Blessed Virgin titled "Mary: Love forever being born."

Mary, as we know, holds a unique place in the Gospel story. The Theotokos (God-bearer) Mary, the mother of Christ, whose assent to God at the annunciation, allowed God to break through the veil and become incarnate in the person of Jesus. God, the creator of the universe, of all that is seen and unseen,

and Jesus, the Word and Love of God, whose birth, life, death, and resurrection are the core of our faith.

Through James Webb, we can see images of ancient stars and galaxies long expired, as well as new stars being created and new galaxies being formed. Birth, life, death, re-birth (or resurrection): a divine mystery. Sounds very churchy, doesn't it? And this image of Mary, allows us to see this same divine mystery in motion.

Love came into the world through Mary. And through Mary, love is forever being born in us. We just have to follow Mary's example by saying "yes" to God. conduct infrared astronomy, allowing everyone, experts God doesn't work in isolation. Rather, God seeks to

> partner with us. God, you see, is in relationship. God is in community. Like Mary, we too are called to bear Christ in the world today – to bear that love in the world today.

We have entered the season of Advent, a season of preparation for the coming of Christ - the coming of love into the world. As sung in the beloved Advent hymn, "Love came down at Christmas, love so lovely, love divine. Love was born at Christmas. Star and angels gave the sign." But it just isn't Christ's first nativity that we are to prepare for, but Christ's second coming – the second coming promised in the Gospels. We are called to slow down and turn our attention to God and to love.

Through Jesus we know the greatest gift that we can give each other is

love. Love, love, love. We can give each other the gift of love that Jesus gave us: a love that is unconditional, unceasing, sacrificial.

This Christmas, let us follow the example of Mary and become bearers of God's love in our world because beloved, the world needs that love. Let us give each other our hearts and the love contained therein. Let us allow love to be born forever in us.

praying for enough wisdom from the experiences in his life to allow him to be a good shepherd to whatever flock he was to lead. The older man thought for a bit,

> and said to him, "It is a shallow pool of wisdom to share when there is only one person to fill it."

> "Oh, the depth of the riches of the wisdom and knowledge of God! How unsearchable His judgments and His paths beyond tracing out" (Romans: 11, 33 – 34).

My kids were told numerous times by their parents that they cannot possibly make every mistake by themselves. There are just too many to make. It's a lot easier to listen to someone else who has that experience, and then make your decision

or take action a little more informed. Thankfully, I am seeing them reach out to ask for advice, and not just from me.

Even my hyper-self-sufficient self has started to learn to ask for not only advice, but actual help. How much better was it for me to have more than one path to take to finish the door? How much better is it for me to have more than one experience to draw upon in life? How much better is it to draw upon the wisdom and
